

## Leviticus 8-10 Daily Study Questions (cont)

4. In Lev 9:1-7 what did Moses tell Aaron and the leaders to do (v1-2, 3-4) and why (v4, 6)? How did they respond (v5)? For whom was Aaron to sacrifice (v7)? Apply.

5. From 9:8-14 describe the sacrifices for Aaron and his sons (v8-11, 12-14)? Why were they required to sacrifice for themselves, and not just for the people?

6. Using 9:15-21 what was offered for the people (v15, 16, 17, 18, 19-20, 21)? As they watched all of this how do you think they were affected? What about God?

7. Read 9:22-24. What did Aaron (v22, 23) and Moses (v23) do after the sacrifices were made? After their blessings what 2 things happened (v23, 24), and what was the effect (v24)?

8. According to 10:1-11 what evil thing occurred (v1) and what resulted (v2). What did Moses tell Aaron and his nephews (v3, 4, 6-7, 8-11) and why? What did they do (v3, 5)?

9. In 10:12-15 what did Moses command next (v12, 14)? Where were the priests to eat each offering (v13, 14), and what was their portion (v12, 15)? What principle is taught here?

10. Based on 8:16-20 what else did Aaron's sons do wrong (v16-18) and what was Aaron's justification (v19)? How did Moses respond (v20)? Do you agree with his response?

11. Looking at Lev 8-10 what can we learn from the setting apart of the priests, the separate offering for the priests, and the extreme consequences of priestly sin? How does this apply to us since we are all priests to God?

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### Life Group Questions—Radical Faith Heroes –Jacob—Heb 11:9, 21

*(Using questions based on today's message, Life Groups meet in homes to build supportive relationships with others at Celebration Fellowship that enable us to grow in Christ.)*

1. Share with the group one of your most embarrassing moments and what you felt like after it was over.
2. Read Heb 11:21. Trace the life of Jacob from start to finish—his birth (Gen 25), deception (Gen 27), sojourn in Paddan Aram (Gen 28-33), back home, Egypt, death. When did he finally start putting it all together?
3. Why did Jacob deceive his brother, and what do you think is the reason behind most deception? Is this a problem common to all or just a struggle some have? Explain.
4. What events in Jacob's life brought him to a position of brokenness? How would you define brokenness? If you've had an experience like this describe it to the group.
5. What does it say to you that Jacob was able to get to the place where he could bless his sons? Where are you right now?
6. What needs to happen in your life for you to be able to bless others—specifically where do you need to move from self-reliance to dependence on God?
7. Pray with one another for the willingness to get to a place where God can use you to bless others.

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## Just Do What I Say And... Introduction to Leviticus 8-10

### The 5 Purposes of the Purpose Driven Life

- **Worship**—You were planned for God’s pleasure
- **Fellowship**—You were formed for God’s family
- **Discipleship**—You were created to become like Christ
- **Ministry**—You were shaped for serving God
- **Evangelism**—You were made for a mission

When a burglar enters a room waving a gun he often says, “Just do what I say and no one will get hurt.” This applies to the study this week regarding the duties of the priests. They were God’s representatives before the people so they had to obey God’s instructions in every detail. If they did so they would be able to effectively minister to the people in behalf of God and they would honor Him by their obedience. The first step was the ordination of the priests, their ceremonial dedication to God. This was to be done at the doorway of the tabernacle in public view of the people. Moses washed them with water and dressed them in the holy garments; he then anointed them, along with the tabernacle and its furniture, with oil. Then, they laid their hands on the bull of

the sin offering which was slaughtered, its blood poured out, its fat burned up, and its hide burned outside the camp. After this rams of burnt offering and ordination were offered in their behalf. Their ordination concluded as they ate a meal together from the meat of the ram and remained seven days. Moses then commanded Aaron and his sons to offer sacrifices for the priests and people. This would allow God to meet with them in His glory. So, they all brought their sacrifices, and Aaron and his sons offered the sin and burnt offerings for themselves. Because they, too, were sinners, this had to precede their priestly work for the people. Then, they offered the sin, burnt, grain and peace offerings for the people as commanded. When this was done Aaron and Moses blessed the people, and God

sent fire to consume the sacrifices, causing the people to shout for joy. Sadly, objectionable actions by the priests occurred soon after this. Two of Aaron’s sons offered incense without using the coals from the right altar. God consumed them with fire, and commanded that Aaron and his sons not mourn. Later they failed to eat the sin offering and were rebuked by Moses. He explained that God demanded to be treated as holy by those who drew near to Him. As they learned, if you will just do what God says, no one will get hurt.
